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INTRODUCTION

Uganda Youth Development Link (UYDEL) has been able to mobilize young people in the community for positive youth development with contributions from several community structures. (Communities have an extraordinary capacity for asset building in youth and establishing supporting relationships [peer, friends and family]. This has contributed to the creation of a safe and protective environment for children), developing specific life skills and assets to help children make safe choices to protect themselves and to build peaceful relationships with others through promoting a more protective environment at the different drop in centers.

NUMBER OF YOUNG PEOPLE AT THE CENTER

The number of young people at the center has gone up in the last year following an initiative by the team, to reach out and identify more young people in the area. This

has been achieved through community outreaches, encouraging young people to spread word in their communities and among peers, working hand in hand with different community structures and institutions like police and LCs to identify and refer young people that could benefit from the program, to the center. From the 113 young people reported in 2014, the drop in center now offers vocational skills to a total number of 120 young people between the ages of 13-24 years as presented in the graph bellow: (Jan- Dec 2015)




Figure 1 total number of young people at the center

Most of these young people hail from within the Mukono town area and surrounding villages within Mukono district. Of the 120 young people, seven are from Mukono town and the rest from nearby villages. The challenge is that most of these villages are somewhat located far from the center and they have to travel to and fro, some of them with children. They are hindered by both distance and the unpredictable weather changes especially during the rainy seasons, and this makes their attendance quite inconsistent.

Chart: showing number of young people and the different villages they come from within Mukono




Figure 2 villages with number of young people

VOCATIONAL SKILLS

Initially, the drop in center offered only one skill set in the field of hair dressing and has seen quite a good number young people master and graduate successfully. Fortunately with continued funding from donors and support from the UYDEL head chapter in Kampala, the center now offers a total number of three vocational skill sets, that is; hair dressing, electronics and catering as illustrated in the graph bellow.

Adding electronics to the skills we offer at the center allowed us to engage and reach more boys from the community as it is a skill they are greatly interested in. The class now has a number of 17 young people, of which 11 are boys and 6 are girls.

COUNSELLING AND GUIDANCE SESSIOINS

Young people are a key part of the informal and sometimes formal elements of the system, and have a role to play in their own protection and the protection of others. Internal and external assets can be built which help youth to thrive and contribute to their communities. Life skills and spiritual development can build children's capacity to make good decisions, influence their peers and environment positively, and build resilience to difficult situations
