









Project Background

UYDEL in partnership with Lutheran World Federation are implementing the Urban Youth Empowerment Project (YEP) phase Two in Rubaga, Nakawa and Makindye Municipalities in Kampala, Uganda for a period of four years (2020-2023) with Financial Support from Icelandic Church Aid. The YEP Project targets slum young people aged 13 to 24 years and is aimed at building a strong, stable and organized communities of slum dwelling youth in Rubaga, Nakawa and Makindye municipalities in Kampala. The Youth Empowerment Project also aims to empower vulnerable slum youth with increased access to employable skills and their rights to economic development are respected and fulfilled by 2023; and that the vulnerable slum youth have increased access to and utilization of youth friendly sexual reproductive health rights services and information by 2023. These outcomes directly contribute to the achievement of the Global Sustainable Development Goals: Goal 1: End Poverty in all its forma everywhere; Goal 8: Promote inclusive and sustainable economic growth, employment and decent work for all and; Goal 3: Ensure healthy lives and promote wellbeing for all at all ages.







